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Pastor's Reflections: A Five Star Church!

I've heard of five star restaurants before and have even eaten at a few of them, but a five star church? Hey, why not? And why not the Unitarian Universalist Church of Indianapolis? It was great to hear how the *Nuvo* reviewer, Phil van Hest, a self-described agnostic who was reared as an atheist, experienced Sunday worship in our congregation. Sometimes when one has grown accustomed to a thing, it is difficult to step back and get a sense of what that thing would seem like to a stranger — someone uninitiated into the ways of the insiders. Worship is certainly an example of this, because in worship it is where we proclaim and celebrate what we hold dear and that to which we aspire. He astutely observed that there was “a sense that these people were all truly building something together by choice.” As your pastor, that was really great to hear. We ARE building something together, even though we come from disparate theological perspectives as well different social-economic strata, races, cultures, gender expressions, etc. That is not an easy thing to do and is fraught with a multitude of challenges, but here was a man who walked into our sanctuary two Sundays ago and discerned this. Let's honor it, hold it up, and use it as a means to inspire us to do even more; to break down the walls that separate our insular church community from that of the neighborhood in which we reside and from the greater Indianapolis community! There are so many opportunities out there for us to live out our liberal faith.

I'm heartened that after not having a caring committee since last year there are taskforces forming to meet the needs of our members. Through a website, a member has organized meal delivery for a family welcoming a baby into their lives. A couple of members have stepped forward to give rides to people who wish to attend Sunday worship. Adult religious education is making a comeback with a number of workshops and classes in the works for this winter and spring. Many of our families turned out to help the Danville church with their Christmas ministry and afterwards said how much they wanted UUI to do work like that in our own community. In response, a number of members are investigating opportunities available for our church to partner with existing social justice and outreach programs in our community and in the city.

So, take heart. The committee on ministry has been holding community circles in an effort to discern and then articulate what people wish the mission of the church to be. With a succinct, outwardly focused mission statement we will be able to gather round it and then fulfill that mission by working together in our church and in the greater community. That “palpable sense that [we are] all truly building something together” will then be made manifest in all things we do.

Lifespan Faith Development



This semester the Senior High class is focusing on a Social Justice & Action curriculum. Social justice is so embedded in who we are as UU's. Just looking at our seven principles, you can see how social justice is such a part of us: each person is important, be kind in all you do, we're free to learn together, we search for what is true, all people need a voice, build a fair and peaceful world, and we care for Earth's lifeboat.

So how do we help our children hold these values as they grow and eventually move out into the world? Holly Case from the "How to Make a Family" writes; *Making the world a better place becomes even more imperative when you have kids. Of course, you want to do everything you can to improve the state of the world. But even more important than that is how you raise your kids. It's not enough to assume that if your kids never see you acting in a prejudiced manner, that they will grow up to be socially conscious, concerned adults. Ensuring that your children are prepared to make the world a better place begins in childhood.*

Our UU churches are definitely a great place to start! However, teaching social justice needs to happen in children's home life as well. Most families have the basics: refuse-reduce-reuse-recycle, be kind to your neighbors & friends, putting change in the collection boxes on counters. Yet, does your child know why we do these things.

What about beyond the basics? There are so many organizations and people in need, sometimes it is difficult to know where to begin. So, I say, start with your children! Ask what is important to them. You may be surprised, from the mouths of babes, sometimes children really have a grasp of what is going on around them. Then go with it. This is what we did in our home. When we used to live in the city of Dayton, Ohio, it was common for us to walk and bike everywhere. It was also common to get stopped by someone asking for money. My daughter, who at the time was seven, took great notice to this and started asking questions. Then she wanted to know what she could do to help people in the situation where they had to ask for money. With some thinking & brainstorming, she came up with the idea to hold an ice cream social in a local park to raise money to donate to a local shelter. A few hundred dollars later, she learned how she can make a difference. It begins by talking with your children. They will have ideas on what is important to them. Then, encourage them to take steps to helping, whatever that means to them.

We make change in our world by helping our children pave a path. For me, this is the foundation of social justice.



Healing Your Image of God

Is the God of your understanding and experience a God who welcomes you into relationship and cares about the created world, or do you experience God as remote and judgmental? Is your image of God one that invites you into intimacy or one that frightens you and makes you wary? Often, even those who don't believe in God know what that god is like, ideas based on childhood and cultural understandings of God. Many people want God to be present in their lives, but not the one they learned about in the religious institutions of their families. In this workshop, drawing on the work of the Rev. Jane Vennard, we will examine our ideas of God and then through discussion, storytelling, drawing, and writing figure out if our understanding of God needs to be changed. Decide what you would like to bring, enter your information and get cooking! You might not even need to cook, perhaps your contribution will be a steaming hot pizza and a salad!

From the Board President

I always tell people that meetings of the Board of Trustees are open for anyone to attend. At the January meeting, around 20 members of UUI took me up on this. Unfortunately, the reason for them attending was based on rumors that a petition was circulating to remove Pastor Stephen or that the Board itself was trying to do so as well as that Board members were withholding pledges. The Board assured those in attendance, and I want to let you know as well, that none of these rumors are true. The Board is supportive of Pastor Stephen and wants his ministry at UUI to be a success.

However, the Board is aware of tensions within parts of the congregation, much of it in response to changes at UUI. Recently, a letter was delivered to Pastor Stephen expressing concerns felt among the signers to changes at UUI. Even though this letter expressed the signers desire for Pastor Stephen's ministry to be successful, we believe it is the source of the rumors mentioned earlier. The letter as well as the rumors related to it are symptoms of the changes at UUI.

Change is not easy. The tension it creates can be healthy and strengthen a congregation, however we feel that things are beginning to be too divisive. We don't know how to calm these tensions ourselves, so we have begun a conversation with Heartland District Executive Lisa Presley about things we can do to move forward in a positive direction. We will be continuing our discussions within the Board, as well as with Pastor Stephen and the Committee on Ministry. Where these conversations take us, we don't know. But what we do know is that everyone at UUI is valued and welcome and that we all need to work together to make UUI the vital, thriving congregation it can and should be.

The Keynote Speaker will be the Rev. Dr. Mark Morrison-Reed. Now retired, he has been a UU Minister for over 30 years and has taught at Meadville Lombard Divinity School. He writes about his presentation as follows,

"Torn Between Fuzzy Aspirations and Hard Realities: There is a surprising, and painful, truth behind Unitarian Universalist efforts to become more racially and culturally diverse. This truth must begin with taking an honest look at who we are and why we are who we are, and it ends in a conundrum but not without hope. If UUs really want to change, accepting the truth is the only place to start. Torn between our reality and our aspirations what are we do do? This presentation considers why achieving diversity is challenging, but also talks about which congregations became successfully diverse and how."

Also learn about UUA General Assembly (GA) that will be held in Phoenix, Arizona June 20-24. This special GA will be focused on hands on social witness opportunities. It is a great way to learn more about our faith, meet and worship with other UU's and learn new skills and worship techniques you can bring back to UUI. Task of the Month Program— Off to a Strong Start

The start-up goal for household sign-ups in the first month of the new Green Sanctuary Task of the Month (ToM) Program was 100. At last count 97 households have initially agreed to participate...a 97% success rate. More are expected to climb on the bandwagon as the project goes into its second month in February.

"This is fantastic," said Deb Edgecombe, who is leading the charge for this energy-saving, environment-enhancing program. "We also know that, at last count, at least 10 households have already completed the first ToM project—insulating their hot water heaters—and others have no doubt done so by now, so we're off to a great start."

The Task of the Month Program has established monthly household projects to help reduce our collective CO2 footprint. And, save us money while we do it. The project for January was insulating the household water heater. For February it is replacing incandescent light bulbs with energy saving CFL bulbs...a total of 6 inside and 1 outside.

Each month, there will be a drawing among participating households for an environmental-related prize. The winner for the first month was Nancy Cobb. Congratulations, Nancy. To be eligible to win, all you have to do is sign up to participate. And, if you sign up and have already done the project please let the committee know so they can track the project's completion rate.

"Best of all," said Ray Wilson, chair of the UUI Environmental Sustainability Committee (the Green Sanctuary team), "if we all participate and complete all of the year-long ToMs, we can save around a million pounds of CO2, greatly reducing our footprint on the environment. Wouldn't that be something to brag about?"

"Also," Wilson added, "if you've been wondering about the 33% stickers on all of the electrical switches and outlets in the church, that's our goal at

UUI...to save 33 percent of the energy the church normally uses."

Energy savings in the church plus savings in the home with the ToM program. Please help us meet our goals. Contact a Green Sanctuary committee member and sign up to participate in the Task of the Month Program today then participate as fully as you can. We'll all benefit as will the environment.
